It explores how living labs – real-world environments where research is embedded in everyday life and practice – can be extended, replicated, or reimaged when they travel: across institutions, communities, industries, and geographies. Together with living labs we discuss the Travelling University concept challenges the assumption that knowledge production is fixed to a single campus or laboratory. When researchers move into communities, workshops, factories, or homes – and when those communities are invited into research processes – new forms of co-creation emerge that are difficult to achieve within conventional academic structures.</p>
